

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



FIGHTING COCK: THE STYLE

**R**adios are very aggressive fighters, and this is often both their advantage and their death knell. As Johnny Jumper says, they aren't very smart fighters because they have only one direction--forward for the kill, win or lose. If the opponent is a superior fighter they lunge into the knife and die instantly. But more often than not, Radios get the first hit because of their sheer aggressiveness. As a Whitehackle and Kelso

hybrid, the Radio has a tendency to cut too much. After fighting in the pit they either leave very injured from too much shuffling or clean and alive because Radios can win super fast against unwary offbeat gamefowl. Radi-

os can break high with the mortal slash, when their opponent is down the Radio is too fast with multi-shuffling hits on top of its enemy. The Radio has a medium-high station.

# Democrats

**D**emocrats fight like their Kelso-Hatch bloodline roosters: intelligent and accurate cutters like Clarets and powerful hitting like the Hatch. Like the Hatch, they also got the notoriety of 'killing an opponent in one blow' even while just sparring with bare spurs or leather put-ons. They fight smart even when they initiate combat, hitting accurately and powerful-

ly. But more often, they watch their opponents for an opening before they attack. Some recommend crosses with modern Kelso's like the Out-and-Out for Philippine-style knife fights for a winning rooster. Crossed with Lemons (Hulsey's) gives the Democrat better counter-attacking instincts and agility. Cross with McRae Black-Hatch gives them speed attacks.

**K**elsos are very smart fighters. Unlike other gamefowl, Kelsos don't jump into the opponents knives in the air, but shuffle and weave, or side-step before launching their own air attack. If a Kelso is first in the air, chances

are, the stupid opponent will be jumping into his knives if sasa-bay siya sa talon. One-two hit and then it's over. As experienced by Robie Yu Panis, herself (farm manager and in-house lady gamefowl gaffer) of the Firebird Gamefarm fame, fighting with

white Kelsos.

Johnny Jumper, Out & Out Kelsos have been known to be really smart fighters on top of power, speed and multiple shuffle or evasion tactics.

Some pundits will say the pure breed ones lack cutting ability, but this is from the old days. Most Kelsos today have already been crossed with good cutters, so they are something to watch out for! The new Kelsos still got the speed and gameness of the pure-breed Kelsos, but are now deadlier with the cutting and plumage of your preferred cross from whatever gamefowl, from Brown Reds to Roundheads or even the Sweater.

Walter Kelsos' originals themselves break high, are multiple shufflers but weak cutters when bred pure from those days when cockers were adamant about bloodline purity. The Kelsos did not gain these amazing gamefowl traits themselves from pure line breeding but from crosses with winning gamefowl that Mr. Kelso would purchase on the spot, during his days breeding fighters. Look for really good cutting gamefowl like roundheads and brown reds or greys which are also game to the core. Kelsos may be both yellow and white legged but the white legged ones are preferred by some buyers.

# Whitehackle

**T**he Whitehackle gamefowl are straight combed with red eyes and are medium stationed. While 90% are yellow red in color, the remaining 10% are spangled, mustard colored hackles. These fighters are built with broad shoulders, fairly compact and with heavy plumage, each rooster having an average weight of 2 to 2.4 kgs. The Whitehackle is a very deadly cut-

ter, break high and can fight in any position available due to their agility and shiftiness, on the ground and in the air. They are strong and power hitting fighting fowl with very deep game. Described by veteran gamefowl aficionados as a ring general, the Whitehackle fights best using the long knife slasher type. This beautiful rooster is a very smart fighter and has accurate timing that places deliberate blows

to kill its opponent. It is also a very aggressive rooster. Because this strain has been carefully sustained by smart breeding over the years, it is still a consistent and proven bloodline that wins big.

Floyd Gurley bred the modern version of the bird straight pure blooded stock to create a uniform bloodline that consistently tops its opponents in the pit until today.

# Wilkins Typewriter

**T**ypewriters fight high in the air and break high too. They can shuffle hit in the air and also on the ground without a bill hold. The Blue stags and cocks are serious dead game. The Judge ( a popular American breeder) lucked out on breeding them off the Phil Marsh line and Oakley Blues, when these gamefowl were still at the top of their game. After all these years, the Typewriters still retain their traits as the best among the Blues. They were notorious for being 'one round or first buckle killer' fighting birds being as deadly as they were.

# Albany



**A**lbanies are mostly light red with black

breast streaked with ginger color, while majority are yellow legged, around 90%, and are mostly pea combed. This gamefowl is one amazing cutter, possessing deep game too.

The Reb Williamson Albany is a power hitting rooster that is very active in the ring. The straight comb Albany is said to be the smarter fighter because it waits for its opponent to make the first move before it reacts, either evading by ducking under the airborne charge or making a counter-attack before the enemy rooster can connect.

They are said to be the perfect cross for the Lemon and the Kelso. To make fighting instincts keener for a counter-attacking style gamefowl.

# PURE BREED GAME FOWL

THERE ARE SOME BREEDING METHODS THAT A GAME FOWL BREEDER CAN CHOOSE IN HIS BREEDING PROGRAM LIKE THE IN-BREEDING, LINE-BREEDING, CROSS-BREEDING, AND OUT-CROSSING.

These breeding methods are being used by fighting cocks breeder in order to produced superior battle cock that can win in any big time derby like world slash-er cup, candelaria, bakbakan, rambulan, digma-an and other major derbies. But for me, I like to breed and fight them pure. For example, pure kelso, pure claret, pure butcher, and pure round heads are being fight in the derby without cross-breeding them to any bloodline. The reason why I like purebred

because, by being pure, I believe that they are superior to others.

To produce a pure breed of game fowl or fighting cocks, you need a pure brood cock and brood hen, for example their bloodline is both butcher. Breed them together to produce a pure butcher bloodline offspring. Select the best offspring according to your purpose, for example if you want to let them fight in the derby select the best and condition or train them properly in preparation for the battle. If your purpose is to preserve the bloodline then keep them for breeding purpose.

You can use the in-breeding method and line-breeding method to produce pure breed. In-breeding means mating of full-brother to his full-sister or vice-versa. Line breeding means mating of brood cock to his pullets or mating of brood hens to her stags. You can also maintain or preserve the bloodline or families of your game fowl by mating the offspring of the full sister and full brother (cousin). In that way, you can produced a pure breed of fighting cocks that can be used as battle cocks or breeding materials. PW





# HOW TO START A SMALL BUSINESS IN LIVE STOCK

IN BUSINESS THERE'S ALWAYS AN UPS AND DOWNS THAT YOU NEED TO DEAL, AND THERE'S SOME BUSINESS THAT YOU DON'T NEED TO HAVE A BIG CAPITAL TO START WITH.

One good idea to start a small business in live stocks is to raise a native chicken. You need to have a space in order to start this kind of business. The things you need to consider starting this business aside from space is the roosters and hens that you are going to be use in your breeding. You need to plan how much you are going to produced. For example, your target is to produce 100 chickens with in the period of 4 months, so you need

to have 20 hens that are ready to lay eggs and 5 roosters.

In the first month, let your hens to lay eggs, produce chicks after that, you are going to take care of the chicks for four months and then at the age of four months the chicken are now ready to sell in the market. There is no problem in selling native chicken because in the Philippines, lots of people who love and wants to eat native chicken. The usual menu for native chicken are chicken tinola, chicken binacol, native chicken lechon, native chicken adobo, and native chicken barbecue.

You can sell your native chicken at 250 pesos per head. If you can produce 100 chickens in four months then you will have 25,000 pesos. You are going to less your expenses, for example 10, 000 then you will have a net income of 15,000.

Aside from selling a four months old chicken, you can also sell a native chicken egg so that you can have another source of income out of your live stock business. PW

# HOW TO PRODUCE BATTLE COCKS

THE AIM OF EVERY FIGHTING COCKS BREEDER IS TO PRODUCE A SUPERIOR BATTLE COCK.

The reason we cross strains is to strengthen weaknesses, and elevate strengths. One of the most successful formulas for breeding fighting cocks is by breeding a power cock over a speed hen. The result is usually well balanced battle cocks that possess all the traits we look for in fighting cocks.

Some guidelines in order to produce superior battle cocks are the following: Dark Legs over Light Legs,

Round bodies over Long bodies, Dark colors over light (and visa-versa), aggressive cocks over Smart fighting hens, Small cocks over large hens (and visa-versa), and Old cocks over pullets, Old hens over stags.

Cross breeding is a breeding system that is applicable in this system in order to produce a superior battle cock. Cross breeding usually improves the average performance of the first generation as in out breeding, and many aces are thus produced. However, generally, the breeding

value of the offspring is greatly reduced. A simple definition for crossbreeding is the crossing of two unrelated closely inbred lines. Roundhead fowl crossed on the Hatch fowl of would be good example.

Gamefowl breeding is one of the most challenging tasks because you need to do some trial and error in order to achieve your goal. You need more time, money, and effort and do some research to produce good battle





crosses. And besides, today there are many good breeders that produced better or best gamefowl that is very hard to defeat in the major derbies like world slasher cup and candelaria derby. [PW](#)

# TIPS IN BREEDING FIGHTING COCKS

**f**ighting cocks breeding is very challenging in the sense that as a breeder, you are going to produce the best battle cock that can compete with other famous and best fighting cocks that is produced by some of the well known fighting cocks breeder who become a champion in world slasher cup, bakbakan, rambulan, digma-www an, and candelaria derby. One important tips in order to become a successful



fighting cocks breeder is to understand the basic of genetics. This can help a breeder to maintain and improve some of the great families of gamefowl that have been passed down through the generations. Maintaining and improving bloodlines



is the primary goal of a fighting cocks breeder. Some would say that cockfighting is practiced to provide an avenue for gambling or to satisfy a primitive bloodlust. An effective breeding program is a process that requires a systematic approach. You need to set your goal and make a plan on how you are going to reach that goal. Upon identifying your goals, choose the best bloodlines to breed and use specific breeding techniques to be use in order to reach your goals. A breeder needs to be flexible and open

mindful so that he can adapt to what ever changes that may occur during his journey in reaching his goals. A fighting cocks breeder needs to become more innovative and always ready to adopt changes and some of the latest technology in fighting cocks breeding. Below are some useful breeding tips in order to become a successful fighting cocks breeder.


1. Establishing specific goals for the breeding program.
2. Identifying and obtaining foundation bloodlines
3. Selecting superior individuals within the bloodlines to breed
4. Setting up the broodpens: choosing breeding strategies
5. Progeny testing: evaluating the success of the program
6. Managing the broodfowl to optimize their productivity and the health of their offspring.
7. Record keeping: keeping it accurate PW

# HOW TO BREED FIGHTING COCKS

BREEDING OF FIGHTING COCKS IS NOT AN EASY JOB; YOU NEED TO HAVE MORE TIME AND MONEY IN DOING THIS AND LOTS OF TRIAL AN ERROR IN ORDER TO PRODUCE A WINNING BATTLE COCK.

**I**f you are a new breeder and you plan to start breeding fighting cocks, you need to find good breeding materials. If possible find a pure bloodline, for example if want to produce a battle cock, you need to find a pure Kelso brood cock and a pure butcher brood hen in order to produce a two way cross battle cock. In my own experiences it is not good to produce a four way battle cock, for example some breeder use a  $\frac{1}{2}$  kelso and  $\frac{1}{2}$  butcher brood cock and cross breed it to a  $\frac{1}{2}$  roundhead and  $\frac{1}{2}$  hatch hen and the offspring is a four way cross battle cock composed of  $\frac{1}{4}$  kelso,  $\frac{1}{4}$  butcher,  $\frac{1}{4}$  roundhead, and  $\frac{1}{4}$  hatch. Two-way cross is much better than a 3-way or a 4-way cross.

Take note that, in every breeding there is always a purpose, if you want to produce breeding materials like brood cocks, brood stag, and brood hens, make sure to produce a pure one. For example,

if you want to produce a kelso brood stag then use a pure kelso brood cock and a pure kelso hen. There are several ways to do this, you can use in-breeding method or acquiring a pure kelso brood cock and a pure kelso hen from different

breeders and breed them to produce a brood stag or brood hens. In-breeding method means to breed brother to his sister, but take note that their offspring will be use only for cross breeding and not to be use as battle cock. **PW**

### **HOW DID YOU GET STARTED IN THIS SPORT?**

My dad, Jim Easterling, got his first fowl in 1963 and he never looked back so I guess you could say that I was born into this sport. While growing up, other people my age would be at the lake or school proms etc. and I chose to be on the farm watering and feeding and going to shows.

### **WHAT FAMILIES OF FOWL DO YOU BREED?**

Bruner RH, Kelso, Butcher and Regular Grays

### **WHERE IS MOST OF YOUR FOWL SOLD TO YEARLY?**

Mostly crossed stags are sold to Mexico. My brood fowl is mostly sold to California, Texas, and the Philippines.

### **HOW MANY CHICKS DO YOU CURRENTLY HATCH EACH SEASON?**

I hatched around 2,500 this year and I plan to up that number to 3,000 next year.

### **WHAT'S YOUR MAIN BLOODLINE?**

I would have to say that the Bruner RH is my main bloodline.

I've never personally seen fowl that can match their athleticism and cutting ability. They are the best crossing fowl that I have ever owned.

### **HOW DID YOU COME UP WITH THE L&L GAME FARM NAME?**

My wife, Kassi, and I named our twin boys Landon and Lincoln and unless I miss my guess, I'm sure they will take over one day hence the name L&L.

### **WHAT CURRENT GOALS DO YOU STRIVE FOR IN THIS SPORT?**

To breed and raise the best, healthiest fowl possible. To make it possible that when people hear or mention RH or Kelso that they attach the name L&L to it.

### **DO YOU HAVE ANY FAMILY WHO ALSO ATTENDS THIS SPORT?**

### **WHAT'S YOUR OPINION ON CULLING?**

I think Culling is one of my most important parts of raising my fowl. If I wouldn't own it, I'm not going to sell it. People who don't cull hard only care about the money and not the fowl or the customer.

### **WHAT DO YOU LOOK FOR WHEN SELECTING GAME FOWL FOR BREEDING?**

Gameness, traits, body conformation, overall health from chick to stag/cock, station, performance. I look at everyday changes (if any) before I put fowl in a brood pen. This is the same with my pullets/ hens. Their parents, brother's performance, station, body, health, and attitude are all considered.

### **ANY TIPS FOR BEGINNERS?**

Do your homework, don't overwhelm yourself with a ton of different breeds. Don't pay attention to the name of the fowl, pay attention to the results, get yourself 2 or 3 lines and on perfecting them. Don't be cheap when it comes to selecting and purchasing your fowl. In this sport you get what you pay for. Take pride in your fowl and take care of them if you want them to take care of you. Never settle for anything less than healthy fowl.

### **ANY ADVICE OR TIPS ON HOW TO PREPARE FOWL FOR A SHOW?**

Learn your fowl, every bloodline is different. In my opinion the key to winning is cutting and that comes from the amount of work VS. rest.

### **WHAT IS YOUR FONDEST MEMORY IN THIS SPORT?**

### **SO, YOU DO THIS FOR A LIVING?**

Yes, when I decided to go from a hobby to a lifestyle I devoted my whole life to it. My shorter days are 10 hours and sometimes the day goes until the next morning. It makes me happy and also makes a way for me to provide for my family. What more could you ask for?



**WHAT IS YOUR OPINION ON BEING A COCKER?**



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


and satisfaction of what I am doing and i will strive for more to have my name of its own on this industry.





As to date, my birds have won 1 world championship derby, several big events and a runner up, going 11.5 pts in the 2017 bakbakan derby for my customers. So far, so good...

**HOW DO YOU MANAGE YOUR FARM?**

My day starts at 4am, I'll gather the boys and designate them into different areas or departments. I'm pretty strict, so each one of them keeps a record of what has been done. But I still check everything at the end of the day because nobody will give as much care as I do.

**WHAT ARE YOUR STRUGGLES IN THIS BUSINESS?**

Every year presents a different challenge and it is never ending. Climate change is a big part of it and the different diseases that arises every year also serves as a threat. So planning ahead and keeping the farm's bio security tight is always a challenge, since we have customers coming from different places.

**IN TERMS OF RECORDING YOUR GAMEFOWL, HOW IS IT IMPORTANT AND HOW YOU WORK ON THIS?**

I keep a good record, because my breeding is based on individuals. It's like creating a pedigree of a certain family.

**HOW BIG IS THE FARM AND HOW MANY EMPLOYEES?**

My farm is 10 hectares and I have eight farmhands.

**WHAT ARE YOUR BEST PERFORMING BLOODLINE AND HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE EACH OF THEIR ABILITY?**

I only keep the three main bloodlines of Blackwater. The sweaters, the stuart yellow leg hatch and the gilmores.



**MY DAY STARTS AT 4AM, I'LL GATHER THE BOYS AND DESIGNATE THEM INTO DIFFERENT AREAS OR DEPARTMENTS. I'M PRETTY STRICT, SO EACH ONE OF THEM KEEPS A RECORD OF WHAT HAS BEEN DONE.**



I can't say which one is the best because it's different every year. Some may perform better than the others so it's really mother nature at work. Aside from expertise, it also comes with alot of prayer. The sweaters breaks well, excellent cutters, throws alot of feet, fast and game. The stuart yellow leg hatch breaks high, accurate deep cutters, because they have this pulling motion everytime they connect. They have very good timing but are slow to the turn and they are dead game. The gilmores are good cutters, fast on the ground, has great endurance, throws alot of feet and are dead game.

**WHAT ARE YOUR STRUGGLES IN TO THIS BUSINESS?**

The struggles are many we live in rural Alabama power outages and erratic weather during early breeding seasons. Making sure we

have a good vaccination program and stick to it. Weather issues as far as getting the baby chicks out of the brooders and on the ground. Trying to keep up with the best technology to help us raise up the healthiest

**IN TERMS OF RECORDING YOUR GAMEFOWL, HOW IS IT IMPORTANT AND HOW YOU WORK ON THIS?**

I would have to say as a breeder keeping specific records of the fowl is the most important thing. At the earliest age of chick hatching we start the marking process. Followed up by wing banding a penning time. It is very important to keep strict records of your base fowl so it’s not to be inbred to closely and also selecting performance individuals to carry on the blood effectively.

**HOW BIG IS THE FARM AND HOW MANY EMPLOYEES DO YOU HAVE?**

At this time we have approximately twenty five acres dedicated for



fowl purposes. It seems like every year we add more property for the purpose of game fowl. We have 130 acres for the poultry. There are five of us who work on the the farm continuously two of those are full time employees. My brother-in-law Jr and Pancho these two are the hardest working and most dependable people we could ever ask for.

**WHAT ARE YOUR BEST PERFORMING BLOODLINES AND HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE EACH OF THEIR ABILITY?**

At the center of everything we do here at Swift Creek Game Farm is our Swift Creek Regular Greys and The Swift Creek Greys. Their ability is to dish out and absorb punishment and never lose the desire to finish the job. In conjunction with the Bruners and Jacobs High Toppers we have found that we can be competitive in any weapon and any where on the globe. The Bruners and Jacobs High Toppers add cutting, athleticism, and vigor to our greys and most anything they are crossed with. We have found that we can mix and mingle these three blood lines together and show at the highest standards in any weapon.

Now, onward and upward! We left off in part 1 of this article describing possible scenarios to follow when you have made a blend (of straightbred or pure fowl) that you consider to be head and shoulders above the rest of the siblings. We talked a bit about things like if the “Special” rooster you are trying to recreate came from a w w efforts on this project more efficiently. Please feel free to review part 1 of this article at any time because after all... This is a digital magazine and the publications will be there for you for years to come!!! So awesome right? So lets start where we left off, Shall we?

We left off talking about taking the original hen back to her son, then grandson and great grandson etc. This is called inbreeding and should not terrify you at all. It is a tool that most true breeders of gamefowl have used at some point in their processes. When done correctly you wont end up with a one eyed, crooked beaked, rooster with 3 legs and an extra wing facing the opposite direction!! Heres the keyword folks when inbreeding its all about selection! The selection processes we spoke of in part 1 is very important. You want to choose individuals that closely resemble your “target” rooster. Same body, style of movement, structure, substance...etc. Everything that makes that target rooster “special” in your eyes is what you want to focus on when selecting the individuals to inbreed back to the original



mother. That wasnt it folks right? You also want to do the exact same process with the original broodcock. Daughter, grand daughter, great grand daughter etc. All resembling the "target" specimen you want to recreate. Once youve done that to lets say....the 4th generation. Youll be at 15/16ths to the original brood cock and hen and in my experience this is generally enough to complete this process. Although you could take it one or two more generations but it is completely

optional at this point. Yes.... this process is time consuming, terrifying, exciting and exhilarating all at the same time folks! Picture in your minds eye that a single hen will give you an average of 10 chicks per setting. Half of which may be roosters and the other half hens. By the time you hit the 4th generation crossback on your inbreeding process your looking at raising 40 birds to breeding age so you can select the best. Thats only on the hen side. Your looking at even more offspring on the

cocks side (because your breeding him back to his daughter(s) each of which will give you approx 10 chicks each) to maturity so you can make your selections to continue the process. So its a process that will no doubt take up time, room, feed and all labor involved with housing, worming and general care for the offspring during this process. Yes, it can be overwhelming but it can also be enlightening as well. What you will end up with after the 4 generations of back crossing will

be your birds bred your way!! They are no longer the "olive oils roundheads" that you started with. Oh no sir's and no ma'ams! They are fully and completely unequivocally 100% your fowl bred your way!

It is my hope that this fact alone will prove to be just enough motivation for the right people reading this article right now to begin this awesome process! There is nothing wrong with being satisfied and proud of breeding fowl that you bought. Nothing at all. But i will say that there is a world of satisfaction and honor with breeding them your way! Especially when inbreeding your way!

Now, lets touch more on exactly where i left off in part 1. The all important home stretch...the last yard...the finish line...the fortune 500...the top enchilada...the grand finale...what this hawaiian hillbilly calls coming across! I can see all your upside down frowns turning right side up now....becoming actual frowns! Oh yes ladies and gentlemen we are not done yet. Once youve reached the goal of 15/16ths to the original cock and hen you'll want to come across with the offspring. Picture in your minds eye again a schematic of the original hen and cock on the bottom of a v shape. Then picture 4 generations of offspring stemming from the originals starting at the bottom



of a v. As you go upwards from the v shape one side is for the hen and the other side of the v for the cock as you go upward with each successive generational inbreeding. Got it? Ok good. So basically a v with dots in it representing each generation as you go upward. First dot will be the 1/2, second dot higher will be 3/4 then the next dot 7/8ths and finally 15/16ths. Keep in mind now our goal for this whole process is replicating or cloning the original "special rooster" that this original pair produced. Remember we talked about having the original pair that produces the special rooster in the last article? If either side of that combination were to be

lost you will not be able to make more special roosters. This is where we see so many people that have unbelievable roosters for a few years and then drop off the spectrum almost like magic! Most likely due to one side of the original parents got lost to age or other forms of becoming deceased, dead, finished, stiff, mongoose food, fertilizer...ok ok enough bolo. This is where this process helps you to stretch out the time frame allowing you to make more of that special blend. I can hear you saying "but bolo... how in the world are you saying we are going to make more of that special rooster when we are inbreeding the parents to the opposite side? It dont make

no sense hillbilly!” Well lets see shall we? Now....that we are all totally confused let the hawaiian hillbilly blow your minds even more right now! We were not directly recreating the original “special” rooster..... we were recreating his parents! Whaaaaaat? Boooooom! Microphone drop and bolo walks off the stage fist pumping to the lyrics “bad....bad....leroy brown hes the baddest man in the whole damn town! Badder than old king ko-o-ong and meaner than a junkyard dog!” Sorry folks bolo just had to do that it was too compelling not to. Woooooo! Anyway back on target.....yes chicken peeps this was a process to recreate the original “special offspring rooster” by recreating his parents while focusing on the qualities you as a breeder want to highlight as seen in the “special rooster” you were recreating! This is where the term coming across comes in. We inbred to both the original hen and roosters side while focusing on the target specimen. Therefore enhancing the qualities you liked so much in the target specimen. Most breeders understand that the hens throw the roosters and the cocks throw the pullets yes? Meaning the mother hen will most influence the male offspring and the father rooster will influence the female offspring. The term used most often is “sex linked” to describe this type of breeding. So, by inbreeding to the original hen side all the while selecting the individuals most resembling the target specimen....we have just super charged her ability to create the target specimen through her sex linked offspring! Same goes for the original cock side folks. Isnt this stuff just awesome!

Now, in all seriousness folks

this process has helped countless top breeders for generations to keep their fowl fresh without infusing new outside blood into their line. Yes, it is completely possible to inbreed using this process and others without having to add new genetics to “freshen up” your line. This process will do it on its own while you are adding or deleting your own little tweaks and finishing touches along the way folks. Lets talk more about “coming across” during the next ride on the bolomans bus!

This hawaiian hillbilly will let everyone sit and chew on this for now and we will continue with part 3 of this freakin awesome article in a future issue of “the purebred warrior”!

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# WHEN NORTH VS. SOUTH MAIN

## 1966 Gamecock

It was the fall of the year 1904 when the idea of a Main between the North and South was given serious consideration. The question of superiority of cocks so bred as well as that of length of gaffs were on the tongues of cockers everywhere and it was supposed that such a contest between formidable breeds of fowl, each bred especially for their type of fight might settle the argument of which cocks northern or southern bred and which gaff's, long or 1 ½ inch were superior.

Ed. F. Burke did not have quite the reputation as some of the more formidable ones during that era but since he was quite popular as a writer for some of the Gamefowl magazines he became involved to the extent of representing the South in the most important affair. It was understood that the Southern Bred, long heel cocks would be the Ginn fowl which were to take on the North.

Up to this time the Wisconsin Red Shufflers owned by D.H Pierce of Appleton, Wisconsin had fought about 42 Mains winning 36.

**ED. F. BURKE DID NOT HAVE QUITE THE REPUTATION AS SOME OF THE MORE FORMIDABLE ONES DURING THAT ERA BUT SINCE HE WAS QUITE POPULAR AS A WRITER FOR SOME OF THE GAMEFOWL MAGAZINES HE BECAME INVOLVED TO THE EXTENT OF REPRESENTING THE SOUTH IN THE MOST IMPORTANT AFFAIR.**

Around 950 of his Shufflers had been fought by him with only 9 recorded runners and the demand for the breed was of course over whelming. Pierce felt that he had perhaps depleted his stock through sales to a dangerous point but since it was to be Burke and the Ginn fowl as his opponent, he didn't hesitate to represent the North in this perhaps the

most important event of his career.

The Articles of Agreement for the main were signed on Dec. 9, 1904 to be fought at Covington, KY, on Jan. 19, 1905, alternating the battles with long and short gaffs.

Just prior to this agreed upon date, Pierce was scheduled to meet the very popular A.P O'Conor in a main for Dec. 30, 1904, a scant 21 days before the North-South event. For some time O'Conor had been considered as a worthy foe for the Pierce Shufflers and at last was to be given his chance. Pierce did not seem to be too concerned about the North-South event but wanted to make sure O'Conor did not manage to beat him in their main as he figured O'Conor would have ace cocks from quite a few individuals who were also interested in one form or another in seeing Pierce defected.

In Preparation for these two events the O'Conor main and the North-South main, Pierce and his help visited and looked over nearly 500 beautiful, broad backed, medium stationed, short legged, lemon hackled Wisconsin Red Shufflers.

From this array of fowl 75 cocks were brought in for the two closely scheduled events. The Pierce - O'Conor main was fought and just as Pierce had suspected, O'Conor was much tougher than he was supposed to be. O'Conor losing to the Shufflers and some odds and ends by only the odd fight. Another main between the two was proposed but an agreement on details could not be met so it was not fought.

On Jan. 10, 1905 Pierce made his selection of 50 Wisconsin Red Shuffler cocks that were past masters in the use of short heels; all medium stationed birds bred strictly to fight it out on the ground and to allow their opponent only one mistake - that of missing them on the break. Therefore, Pierce felt he had no problem in representing his position but alas, several of his choice had been hurt badly in previous fights. These cocks were boarded upon a specially prepared railroad box car in Wisconsin for shipment to the



south but troubles developed enroute to Chicago, where it was necessary to set the cocks out on the platform in sub zero weather while other accommodations were being made up. Upon their final arrival at the conditioning quarters at the corner of 19th and Howell in Covington KY, they were reported as a sad sight to see. The remnants of the cocks used in the O'Connor main were sent for but did not arrive in much better spirits.

Burke and his fowl had been on the grounds at the pit scene for some time and Pierce was rather surprised to see they had about 100 birds in their quarters but very few of them Ginn Gray color. It was later discovered that Pierce's fowl were to fight a combination of cockers composed of not only Burke but John Madigin and possibly E.F. Law as well. Indeed, some of Madigin's Texas Rangers were known to be there as well as others that

could not be accounted for color-wise.

Pierce was a good sport though and didn't take exception to the fact there were only a few cocks that appeared to be the Ginn breed, nor did he mind if there were "silent partners" involved, as he felt he could win over them with sick chickens, and indeed told Burke so after the main, provided he would come to Wisconsin to fight a return engagement but this was never done.

The weather was crisp on the morning of

Jan. 19. 1905, Pierce's cocks seemed to be feeling good and his confidence rose, even to the extent of cutting almost two inches of length off the ends of the wings of the Shuffler cocks, a practice Pierce had found to be worthwhile in long drag fights with the short heel. Remember, these were the old original Shufflers with only the first infusion and no thought had been given to an infusion that would bring them higher in fighting style, indeed, they

were strictly ground fighters with the “hen wallow” shuffle, and that was the way Pierce wanted them.

These were all six feathered branch Shufflers, that is to say, they had no more than six straight tail feathers on each side, exclusive of the sickles. And Pierce would breed no cock that had more than eight tail feathers up each side, at least in the early years.

Upon weighing, only 16 pair in and the big main was on, alternating first the long then The short heels. Burke won the first two fights with Red cocks, and then Pierce won the next Two against a Gray and a Red. In the 5th fight Pierce was against a Red but Pierce cock Ran in the 10th pitting. He 6th Burke's Red cock is counted out in 78 pittings.

In the 7th battle Burke's cock started to run in 3rd pitting and left for good in the 5th. In the 8th Burke's Red cock counted out. In 9th Pierce is rattled to death by a Grey. The 10th fight Burke's Red cock counted Pierce out in 98th pitting. He 11th fight Burke's Red gave Pierce a bran blow and counted him out in the 4th. It was considered by some that the Pierce cock was a runner because he squawked when brained but remained to be counted out. In 12th Burke's Red won in 14th. In 13th Burke's Red killed Shuffler in 3rd pitting and Pierce, seeing no chance to win, forfeited the other fights with a total of 9 to 4 in favor of the South. This main was fought for \$1500 with \$100 per battle but it is said over \$30,000 changed hands.


This was probably the most important defeat in Pierce's

career but he made no excuses for it, just offered to fight it over on his own home grounds rather than in the south, but there were no takers.

Figuring out why Pierce lost is pure conjecture but the closeness of O'Connor main to that of the North-South; his selection of hard fought winners; the shipping of the fowl and the unfortunate circumstances that surrounded the trip; the short cropping of the cock's wings to hold them on the ground and the honest desire to go it alone with the Shufflers against the Ginn Grey's undoubtedly contributed to the losses on his side.

The popularity of the Ginn Grey's no doubt would have increased after this event had it not been for the fact that only two Gray cocks were used in it and little was heard of the breed there after. On the other hand the Wisconsin Shufflers went on to unheard of popularity, not only with the cocking public but with Pierce as well and together they proceeded on through many more events, nearly always with success on their side. Perhaps it was not where the Shufflers won or lost that counted most but how they played the game.

**THE POPULARITY OF THE GINN GREY'S NO DOUBT WOULD HAVE INCREASED AFTER THIS EVENT HAD IT NOT BEEN FOR THE FACT THAT ONLY TWO GRAY COCKS WERE USED IN IT AND LITTLE WAS HEARD OF THE BREED THERE AFTER.**

I have something that bothers me when talking about the classifications of a small, medium, backyard and big time breeders.

Talking about this subjective topic, is it right that if you're a small time or a big time breeder, you are referring to the number you raised and to the quality of the fowl you produced or is it dependable to your capacity of joining certain areas of activities like, derbies, hack fight or even 3,7,9 or 12 cocks (when legal)?


Here's the series of interactions between the small, medium, backyard and big time breeders. And this are all purely honesty and everyone is entitled to their own opinion. So lets check it out how it goes.

**Brent Waddell:** I have a micro farm compared to several people I know. But I am very pleased with the quality of fowl I have. I think a man has to look at. Not how many can I raise but how many can I raise healthy and give them everything they need to be the best that they can be.

**Dave Lao:** I think all of the above defines a breeder's financial capability and space. Because growing more also mean more capital. I will assume the fact that only really healthy, quality stocks are raised, because numbers

don't mean anything if you have fowls of poor quality or isn't raised the way they're supposed to. Meaning their facilities, man power, vaccinations and nutritional needs. If not met, then you will be raising sickly birds and they will be more of a liability.

**Ben Windy Kempfer:** I don't believe that it's a numbers game (quantity) but, I believe it's the legal of competition you choose to compete at.

**Dan Dawson:** I'm a small operation. My bloodlines have competed in legal pits and done very well. I believe that even though my numbers are small, my bloodlines quality is big.

**Ben Windy Kempfer:** That's all that matters. When legal some of the guys that scared me the most was the guys that only raised 15-20 cocks a yr. They maintained a small farm very healthy and well taken care of.

Chris Thatcher: It's the great equalizer.

**Bolo Cortez:** Aloha friends! This is an incredibly juicy subject indeed! Small time, medium, back yard and big time farms. Over the years we've all seen each of these categories in real life farms we may have visited. Some "small time" farms are really

good sized and others may be raising 20 birds a year. It is highly subjective indeed. In retrospect "Big time" farms can be raising over 1000 a year or simply 50-100 ace cocks. I always say never judge a book by its cover. In this day and age with modern technology everything is subjective. I will say though that the "small time or backyard" breeder farms tucked away in the sticks that raise maybe 25-50 cocks a year...them's the ones keeping us all sharp and on our toes!! Going simply by the title "small time, medium, backyard, and big time" I believe can directly correspond and reflect on THE QUALITY OF FOWL PRODUCED by those farms. Meaning a "small time or backyard farm" in one mans eyes will be simply a little farm not meriting recognition because numbers are too low to make an "impact" in the industry. On the other hand those same "small time or backyard farms can be held by some as "Big Time" farms too. Why? well because they put out very high quality fowl consistently that HAVE an impact on the industry. Highly subjective indeed. So in retrospect...a small time farm can be putting out BIG TIME FOWL...and a BIG TIME farm can be pushing out very SMALL TIME roosters. WHOODA THINK IT!!! Yfis, Bolo

**Brent Easterling:** Bolo Cortez has the best answer so far... I'm in no way a big operation and we should've all been backyard breeders at one time or another, I know that my first derby wasn't a 6 cock \$1,000 and I didn't have hundreds to choose from, it was more like a 4 cock...

**Bolo Cortez:** Yes indeed brother Brent. We all started somewhere. It's good to reflect on this fact every now and then. Keeps us humble no matter the numbers we may raise. I think if your out there in the sun, rain, snow or even in the stanky ass mud working your tail off daily...be PROUD of your fowl because you've earned it. Great comments guys and gals! YFIS BOLO

**Chris Thatcher:** CHOICE and SELECTION are the spice of life ....period.

**Allan Cinco:** I consider my self in between, i can say my fowls can fight in big event but my financial capacity is not yet ready. Regardless of bloodlines i know my fowls can do it so far the big event that i joined is Bmeg Endorser Cup third leg in Cebu, 6 stag derby, a total score of 4 wins 2 losses. Last September 8, 2018. I used 5 white kelso bird and one sweater kelso.



## RAFAEL "PAENG" ARANETA


The Lemon 84 was a Duke Hulse cock that was shipped to me in 1967 by the late Duke. At that time the "Duke" had established an outstanding win record in the Philippines using his "Lemon Hackles" as he called them. In breeding they were Hatch/Butcher/Claret. He had established this as a strain and they were so good that almost everybody wanted to have some to breed. But the Duke was under contract to the late J. Amado

Araneta and his son Jorge and would not sell any. I was privileged to have acquired 1 lemon cock & 2 hens in 1965 and the now legendary "84" cock in 1967. I bred him to the hens out of the first lemon cock on the lemon hens. To coin a cliché, the rest is history. I had perpetuated the strain of lemon hackles of the Duke. We bred them every which way and they were just so good, that at that time we dominated the field of locally bred (in the Philippines) chickens. I had let out a few of this lemons to some truly fine gentlemen of the sport who, at one time or another had helped me. Soon the whole province where I lived had some of this blood in their own chickens. I did not care to keep the blood to myself, always believing that something as good as this should be shared, mortality being a reality that confronts us all. Over the years, I had met some of these. Some had whipped me and I whipped some. But whichever side won, made a man proud that he had done something good to the game that would far outlive him. **PW**

Breeders is aiming for that championship in order to be well known so that more buyers will come and buy their battle cocks, brood cocks and brood hens. Cockers also aim to become a champion so that they have more money; there are thousands or even millions of prizes when they get the championship.

To become a champion in derbies it is important to breed only quality

bloodline that is a winning line. You can get it from a well known breeder; now a days you can get quality bloodlines from many reputable gamefarms. Once you have a quality bloodline of brood cock and brood hen you are going to condition them before breeding because a healthy brood cock and hen well produce a healthy offspring and a healthy one has a greater winning percentage compare to a sickly one. To become a champion you need to take good care of your fighting cocks from day 1 old up to the time that you are going to fight them in the derby. Give those proper foods, vitamins, vaccine, and trainings.

There are categories in

derby, the most common are stag derby and cock derby. The method of preparing or conditioning stag is different from cock. There are different conditioning method use and the most common are the 14 days and 21 days conditioning.

Conditioning method will not be discuss here because I want to point out only that in order to be come a champion in derby, you need to have a good and winning bloodline, then you need to take good care of your fighting cocks from the day they were born up to the fight day.
